Berne, February 4, 1917.

Sir:

Pursuant to telegraphic instructions from my Government, I have the honor to inform Your Excellency that, in view of the recent announcement of the German Government of its intention to renew indiscriminate submarine warfare, my Government has no alternative but to pursue the course laid down in its note to the German Government on April 18, 1916. It will therefore recall the American Ambassador and his suite at Berlin and will forthwith deliver to the German Ambassador here passports for him and his suite.

I am instructed to say that the President is reluctant to believe that Germany will actually carry out the threats made against neutral commerce, but, if it is done, the President will ask from Congress authority to use the National power to protect American citizens engaged in peaceable and lawful errands on the high seas. The course taken is, in the view of the President, in entire conformity with the principles enunciated by him in his

address to The Senate on January twelfth, and that he therefore believes that it will make for the peace of the world if the other neutral powers can find it possible to take similar action to that taken by this Government.

I avail myself of this occasion to renew to Your Excellency the assurances of my highest consideration.
