COPY OF THE REPLY OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA TO THE REMARKS MADE BY DOCTOR HANS SULZER WHEN HE PRESENTED, ON AUGUST 27, 1917, HIS CREDENTIALS AS MINISTER OF SWITZERLAND TO THE UNITED STATES.

Mr. Minister:

I am happy to accept the letters of credence by which the Swiss Federal Council accredits you as Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary of the Swiss Confederation to the Government of the United States and to accord you formal recognition in that high capacity.

Also, as the representative of this Government, I am very pleased to hear from you expressions of the true sympathy and friendship of your people toward us.

The United States and Switzerland, founded as they are on the same fundamental basis of democracy, have in common ideals of sympathetic friendship. The trust and confidence which the Swiss Government has placed in the Government of this country is respected and reciprocated.

Your recognition of the importance of this good understanding is gratifying and I shall be most happy to co-operate with you in all that will tend to promote the good relationship between our two countries.
