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The British Counsellor in Bern, R. Lyon-Dalberg-Acton, to the British Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, G. Curzon of Kedleston<sup>1</sup>

Berne, 11 June 1919

With reference to my despatch No. 298<sup>2</sup> of the 23<sup>rd</sup> May, respecting the present situation of the principality of Liechtenstein, I have the honour to report that the Prince of Liechtenstein<sup>3</sup> has now taken up his residence in the principality, no doubt with the object of demonstrating his position as sovereign prince of what is an independent state. This is all the more necessary in view of the fact that in a reign of sixty-one years this is only the fourth time that he has visited his principality.
