

A G R E E D M I N U T E S

of the annual Bilateral Consultations on Development Cooperation
between the Governments of the Islamic Republic
of Pakistan and Switzerland

May 13, 1992

The meeting took place in Islamabad. Mr. R.A. Akhund, Secretary, EAD chaired the meeting as head of the Pakistan Delegation. The Swiss Delegation was led by H.E. Mr. P. Troendle, the Ambassador of Switzerland in Pakistan. The list of participants is attached as Annex-I.

Welcome and Statement by the Head of the Pakistan Delegation

Secretary EAD opening the meeting welcomed the head of the Swiss Delegation Mr. P.A. Troendle, Mr. Serge Chappatte, Head of South Asia Department of the Swiss Development Cooperation and other members of the Swiss Delegation.

He expressed his satisfaction over the fruitful and long-standing cooperation between the two Governments in the field of development and expressed his gratitude for the assistance provided to Pakistan over these many years. He drew particular attention to the assistance Switzerland had granted during the difficult period of refugee influx from Afghanistan and mentioned the continuing need for the expected reconstruction of environmentally degraded areas.

The Head of the Pakistan Delegation gave a summary of the economic developments during the current year and stressed that in spite of early drawbacks due to various reasons the economy has made remarkable progress. Major structural adjustments were undertaken aiming at the reduction of inflation, improvement of the balance of payment and other improvements of the overall economy: He underlined the need for further assistance from the Swiss Government in the social sector and in connection with the implementation of the National Conservation Strategy.

Recognising the consensus reached by the member countries of OECD concerning future mixed financing facilities, the Head of the Pakistan Delegation while expressing his concern over the OECD decision requested to the Swiss Delegation to continue its assistance under Swiss Mixed Financing in some different form till the finalisation of new modalities of Swiss Mixed Financing.

The Head of the Pakistan Delegation introduced the members of his delegation and invited the Head of the Swiss Delegation to make his opening statement.

Statements by the Swiss Delegation

The Head of the Swiss Delegation introduced the members of his delegation and expressed his satisfaction and appreciation over the arrangements made for the consultations.



He praised the excellent cooperation and friendly, constructive spirit between the two governments. He explained the global economic difficulties from which Switzerland is not spared. In this context, the Swiss Government intends to further concentrate its efforts in certain geographical and sectorial areas, worldwide and also in Pakistan. For Pakistan a concentration has been made in mutual consultation on the provinces of NWFP and Sindh.

With reference to the mixed financing, he informed that more detailed new modalities of assistance are currently prepared and has given the assurance that Pakistan will again benefit from further financial cooperation under the new conditions.

Mr. Serge Chappatte, Head of South Asia Department at Swiss Development Cooperation in Berne expressed his pleasure to be in Pakistan for the bilateral consultations.

He referred to the discussions at the recently held consortium meeting and elaborated on specific aspects of the Pak-Swiss cooperation programme. He particularly highlighted the requirement for social, institutional and economic sustainability in development undertakings. Switzerland is specially concerned about the social sustainability and endeavours to promote broad-based participation of the communities and a higher responsibility of the same. Similarly, he stressed the need for intensifying the internal resource mobilisation through increased user charges, etc. He emphasised that more efforts should be made for improving operation and maintenance, e.g. through the strengthening of the role of Water Users Associations or other groups. He reiterated the intentions of the Swiss Government to concentrate in selected areas and sectors, while some nationwide activities such as Potato project, Shelter project, Electronic Training institute will be continued.

As a follow-up to the statement of the Swiss Delegation the Head of the Pakistan Delegation draw particular attention on the financial requirements through matching funds for the Social Action Programme. He also appreciated the decision to undertake more efforts in the field of small enterprise development.

GENERAL ISSUES OF COOPERATION

Project Planning, Approval

It was explained that the frequent delays in approval of projects over the past years have slowed down progress of projects considerably, resulting in slow and low disbursements and led to considerable demotivation and insecurity among local and expatriate staff. The Government of Switzerland is seriously concerned about the long and often intransparent approval process of PC-1s and agreement. Representative of NWFP explained that they are making all possible efforts for early processing of the PC-1 and clearance of the Draft Agreement.

The Head of Pakistan Delegation stressed the need for transparent and proper planning and approval procedures for reasons of accountability. The Government of Pakistan is undertaking concrete measures to streamline the procedures.

Funding position for development projects

Many projects have suffered serious delays and setbacks due to the lack of financial allocations in the provincial or federal budgets. In view of the constrained economic situation and the still narrow basis of domestic resource mobilisation further financial shortcomings are expected. In spite of the assurance provided by the Government of Pakistan that donor-funded projects are given priority, a number of funding difficulties have hampered the progress of the projects (LBOD, PSPDP, SSHP). The representatives of the Provincial Governments of NWFP & Sindh as well as concerned Federal agencies assured that adequate funding will be made available for the proposed projects.

Training opportunities

The Government of Switzerland disposes of a number of opportunities for training abroad either under special schemes or within the project framework. Unfortunately, many of these opportunities are not availed of because the nominations for the courses or study tours are not cleared on time. The Head of the Pakistan Delegation informed that the project related training facilities have been generally fully utilised. In case of other facilities of a limited number, it would be ensured that nominations are furnished in time.

The Government of Switzerland proposes that arrangements for courses and tours are only made when acceptable candidates have received NOC.

Import procedures

In the past the import of consignment for the purpose of the projects had been effectuated according to the guidelines and the practice as provided by EAD and the custom authorities. But recently the custom authorities have refused to clear consignment of equipment imported for Rangeland & Livestock Development Project without an Import Permit. It was explained that the custom authorities require import permit only in case of the project of SAZDA (which is an autonomous body) whereas in case of other Swiss assisted projects which are executed by Federal and Provincial Governments import permit will not be required. However, the representatives of the Ministry of Commerce informed that the policy issue related to removal of import permit condition even for a project of an autonomous body is under consideration. Besides the Head of Pakistan Delegation

have also given assurance that import procedure for Swiss aided projects will be according to the provision of respective project bilateral agreements. The representatives of the Ministry of Commerce stated that the problem in regard to import procedure faced by SAZDA would be examined by them for remedial action for which a case may be referred to them by Economic Affairs Division.

Visa extension of expatriate staff

The visas of the expatriate staff and their dependents working under the various projects require regular updating. Swiss side reported delays in the issuance of visas to expatriate and their family members. In fact delay has occurred in a few cases in the Interior Division. The representative of the Interior Division who attended the meeting was asked to note this point for corrective action ensuring timely issuance of visas to the expatriates. Assurance was given that extension of visa will be granted within one month after submission of application.

Special programmes for women

The representative from Ministry of Women Development noted that insufficient emphasis is given to the promotion and support of the womenfolk. She pointed out specific areas for assistance. The representative of the Government of Switzerland mentioned that this aspect is taken care of through balanced gender development in existing projects.

REVIEW OF THE PROGRAMME

Ongoing Projects

Bilateral Projects

a) Pak-Swiss Institute of Industrial Electronics Engineering, Karachi

The Swiss Delegation mentioned that in 1991 the former "Pak-Swiss Engineering Centre for Industrial Electronics" was renamed. A new institute, the "Institute for Industrial Electronics Engineers" was created. The annual intake of students has been increased during Phase II from 35 to 40. Moreover, the curriculum has been amended in order to comply with the requirements for the recognition of the "bachelors' degree". At least 50% of the total training time is still reserved for practicals in workshops and laboratories. A third batch of students started at the Institute in July 1991. By the end of 1991, a total of 106 students were attending the 4 years training course.

The Swiss Delegation expressed the intention to enter into discussions and negotiations regarding the continuation of the project into a phase III before October 1992.

The Swiss Delegation was informed that the PC-1 has been revised and will be approved in the coming weeks. Subsequently, the affiliation of the institute by NED will be recognised.

The representative of PCSIR will compile a report for EAD and Swiss Embassy on the progress made so far regarding the approval of the PC-1, induction of staff and the expected affiliation to the NED. He will also give an account of the expected period for completion of this process.

b) Kalam Integrated Development Project

The Swiss Delegation informed that 1991 was an intensive year of review of past experiences and conceptual planning of the continuation into the fourth and last phase of the project. Following an agreement between the provincial authorities and Government of Switzerland a planning mission was fielded in November 1991. The mission report and the detailed concepts for the future phase were discussed and agreed upon in a joint meeting on March 29, 1992. The last phase is designed to prepare arrangements for the long-term sustainability of the institutions' effective support to the project area and to continue the effort of strengthening the capacity of the Village Organisations. The Government of NWFP has assured a contribution of Rs. 67.359 Mio and Rs. 103.886 Mio as recoverable investments (under FDC) towards the implementation of the 5-year project while the Government of Switzerland has indicated a total contribution of Rs. 80.078 Mio and 108 manmonths of technical assistance. The corresponding PC-1s are under preparation and are expected to be approved within the next few weeks.

In order to resolve serious timber extraction problems in the forests of the Kalam area and the whole NWFP major investments in machinery are urgently required. These investments are to be made through the Forest Development Corporation (FDC). The costs arising from these investments will be recovered from the proceeds from timber sales. During the next phase of the project it is proposed that purchases of equipment and machinery amounting to approx. Rs. 41 Mio are to be made. Machines and equipment valued at approx. Rs. 24 Mio which are not available in Pakistan have to be imported. The representative of the NWFP government indicated that provisions will be made for arranging the necessary foreign exchange funds.

The sustainable management of forest resources and the long-term support to the farming community require that a reasonable number of staff has to be posted on a regular basis to the area. The Government of Switzerland requires

explicit clarification as to what extend regularisation of necessary staff will take place during the last phase and at the end of the project. The representative of the NWFP Forest Department informed that provision have been made in the PC-1 and final decision will be taken on the occasion of the approval of the PC-1s.

c) Agricultural Light Engineering Project, Mardan

The Swiss Delegation mentioned that phase III is emphasizing the support provided by the Project to the small metal workshops in the selected area on a decentralized basis. Stress is put on skills development, both technical and entrepreneurial, access to information and credit, contacts between manufacturers and farmers, linkages with other supporting institutions. That means that ALEP is discontinuing its own productive activities and will concentrate on provision of services.

The Swiss Delegation expressed their concern over the possible detrimental effect of the Productivity Enhancement Programme.

The Swiss Delegation expressed their satisfaction that the funds for the project had been released and the staff's contract have been extended. Some vacant posts have been advertised for recruitment.

d) Pak-Swiss Potato Development Project

The Swiss Delegation expressed their concern about the considerable delay of approval of the PC-1s for the provincial components and the PC-1s for the federal component and the Umbrella PC-1. An understanding was reached that the objectives and concepts of the Provincial PC-1s are given priority over the summary given in the Umbrella PC-1 while implementing the project, thus eliminating the earlier inconsistencies.

The Swiss Delegation was informed that funds had been made available according to the requirements at federal as well as provincial level. It has been given the assurance that no future shortcomings are expected. The Swiss Delegation emphasised that the Government of Switzerland will not provide any additional funds for bridging financial gaps or substitute obligations of PARC.

The Swiss Delegation was also explained that a decision has been taken to provide office space at NARC to partly accommodate the project staff.

Regarding the transfer of staff on the non-development side confirmation was given that this has been implemented and financial allocations had been made for this purpose.

The Swiss Delegation was informed that the recruitment of qualified professional staff is extremely difficult and may therefore take more time. The Swiss Delegation expressed its justification over this fact as these posts have been vacant over very long time and requested PARC to undertake a special effort in this regard.

The Swiss Delegation expressed its satisfaction that administrative approval has now been granted in all provinces, except Sindh, which is expected shortly.

e) Malakand Fruit and Vegetable Development Project

The Swiss Delegation was informed that the project having had a late start into its phase II is now in full operation and makes all efforts to compensate for the lost ground. Discussions have been initiated between the provincial authorities and the Government of Switzerland regarding a continuation into a next phase. The Swiss Delegation has expressed its willingness to continue its assistance to this important sector, albeit under different arrangements taking into account the past experiences. A review is presently taking place and a planning mission to formulate the concept for the next phase is scheduled for fall 1992.

The Swiss Delegation expressed its satisfaction that major, long-standing issues have been brought to an acceptable solution.

The Swiss Delegation has mentioned its concern regarding the granting of high subsidies for inputs and services provided through government-owned centres. The Swiss Delegation urges the Government of NWFP to thoroughly review the policy of subsidy, in particular those of the Fruit and Vegetable Development Board and the effectiveness as well as the consequences on the private sector of Government-run production centres. In addition, efforts are recommended in order to devise measures to promote the same services and inputs in the private sector.

f) Rangeland Management and Livestock Improvement Project in the Sindh Arid Zone

The Swiss Delegation informed that progress in this project has continued to be rather modest due to several factors, of which the law and order situation, the shifting of the SAZDA-Headquarters again from Mirpurkhas to Hyderabad and the insufficient rainy season are the major ones.

The further financial commitment of the Government of Switzerland for the completion of the first phase of the project has been formulated in detail through an exchange of letters which has been cleared by EAD.

During the current year the project will be subject to an in-depth evaluation through which the past experiences and deficiencies as well as the future prospects for continuation of the project will be assessed. If these results warrant, a planning mission for the preparation of the next phase, possibly starting June 1993 shall be fielded. In this context, it will be important for the Government of Switzerland to be informed of any measures taken concerning the restructuring of SAZDA, as proposed in the Rural Development Strategy for Sindh Arid Zones.

The Swiss Delegation was informed that the remaining staff vacancies will be filled through internal adjustments.

g) Pak-Swiss Swabi Irrigated Agriculture Project

The Swiss Delegation informed that the project has embarked on a major exercise to review the past results and their validity for their incorporation into the Agricultural Development Component of the Swabi SCARP. It is expected that the project will continue into a next phase to further refine the water management models and to support the larger Swabi SCARP project. The representative from the NWFP Department of Agriculture confirmed the need for the continuation of the project into a next phase. Components, institutional framework and the definite role of this support project will be further defined in the coming months. A planning mission is scheduled to take place in fall 1992.

h) Pak-Swiss Small Hydel Development Project

The Swiss Delegation informed that it is likely that due to the slow start of the project the present period has to be extended by some months, thus the present PC-2 requiring extension.

The Swiss Delegation was pleased to learn that the vacant posts have been advertised and the staff will be recruited shortly.

Serious concern was expressed that aspects of small hydel development might be neglected, as SHYDO intends to embark not only on small hydel plants. The Head of the Pakistan Delegation advised that a clear segregation of small from large and medium plants is required to avoid such problems.

i) Non-Governmental Organisations

The Swiss Delegation informed about the financial assistance extended to various non-government organisations. This assistance is provided to development-oriented NGOs in the fields of women development, rural development, urban development, environmental issues.

The Pakistan Delegation emphasised the requirement for continuous information on the cooperation programme with NGOs.

*MULTILATERAL PROJECTS*a) Income Generating Project in Refugee Areas in Pakistan

The Swiss Delegation has indicated the willingness to participate in the forthcoming inception mission for IGP-III but makes mention of the difficult cooperation arrangements and open questions regarding the continuation of this project. The Pakistan delegation supported the proposal to identify a separate rehabilitation project on a bilateral basis. A specific dialogue will be undertaken between the Government of Switzerland and the NWFP provincial authorities on this subject.

b) Left Bank Outfall Drain

The Pakistan Delegation requested the Swiss Delegation to consider additional financing of the Swiss-financed components of On-Farm Water Management and Monitoring and Evaluation. The Swiss Delegation drew the attention on the slow progress of the project but expressed satisfaction about the decision taken by the Government of Sindh in resolving a long-standing issue of the supervisory consultant. It also clarified that no additional funds was needed and that the already committed funds can be used to its full extent.

To pursue the proposed action plan which the cofinanciers submitted to the Government of Pakistan during the recent meeting in Islamabad, the Swiss Government will continue the reassessment of the On-Farm Water Management Component and propose improvements. A revision of the PC-1 is not excluded. The Government of Switzerland wishes to express its hope that such a restructuring will be effectuated without major delay.

The Swiss Delegation expressed its concern that no follow-up is given to the recommendations, including the financial aspects, made by the supervisory consultant. Agreement was reached that Government of Sindh will submit a report on this issue and the financial shortfalls to EAD for information to the Swiss Embassy.

c) Swabi SCARP/Agricultural Development Component

The Swiss Delegation informed that this project is presently under preparation and is due to start from mid June, 1993.

d) Strengthening of Agriculture Project planning, monitoring and evaluation in Sindh

The Swiss Delegation informed that in view of recent improvements in project implementation the Government of Switzerland has agreed to extend the project period until end August 1993.

e) Shelter for low income Communities National Investment Project Preparation

The Swiss Delegation expressed its concern about the inconsistency of cost recovery policy between this project and the ongoing Second Urban Development Project in NWFP, which is co-financed by the Asian Development Bank. The Head of the Pakistan Delegation advised the concerned parties to reconcile the two projects taking into consideration the need for cost-recovery.

The Swiss Delegation informed that the detailed project preparation work requires extension of several contracts. The Government of Switzerland agreed to extend its contribution for project preparation and support the implementation of Pilot Projects which aim at developing and testing the cooperation between communities and local bodies.

During the wrap-up meeting of the pre-appraisal mission in March 1992 the Government of Switzerland expressed its interest to take the finalised study further into a. Investment Programme and provide an appropriate financial contribution to its implementation from 1993 onwards. The Pakistan Delegation was informed that a formal request for further assistance will be needed shortly.

f) Pakistan Forestry Masterplan Project

The Swiss Delegation informed the meeting about its contribution to this undertaking and that the Government of

Switzerland maintains a keen interest in the finalization and the outcome of the Forestry Masterplan.

Completed Projects in 1991

The Swiss Delegation informed that the following three projects were completed during 1991:

- a) Grain Storage Project
- b) Rural Development Strategy for Sindh Arid Zone
- c) On-Farm Water Management III/Sindh

The Swiss Delegation was given the assurance that it will be informed soon about the actions taken by the Government of Sindh regarding the implementation of the recommendations proposed in the report on the Rural Development Strategy for Sindh Arid Zone.

Mixed Financing

The Swiss Delegation informed about the present status of the Swiss Mixed Financing to Pakistan. The Mixed Financing made available to WAPDA (40 million SFr.) has been now fully utilized while the credit line to PICIC/private sector is about to be firmly committed. Against an uncommitted balance of S.Fr.7.47 Million, PICIC have since submitted two textile projects for approval of Swiss authorities, who have accepted one for Swiss Mixed Financing whereas the other one is still to be approval.

Humanitarian Aid

The meeting was informed that the Government of Switzerland continues to support the efforts of the Government of Pakistan and of the international community in favour of the victims of the Afghan conflict. It has been co-financing the Income Generating Project for Refugee Areas (World Bank, UNHCR, SAFRON) since its inception and has approved a further contribution of SFr. 2.5 Mio towards the bridging period and phase III of the project. A further contribution will depend on the outcome of and the needs after a political settlement.

Moreover, Switzerland has granted annual aid to the programme of international humanitarian organisations in general and those assisting Afghan refugees in Pakistan. Particularly the International Red Cross Committee (ICRC) has been supported with

a Swiss contribution of SFr. 500'000.--, while UNOCA was given an amount of SFr. 300'000.-- for various activities.

Training and Scholarships

During 1991, the Government of Switzerland has granted overseas scholarship to 4 persons under special schemes (CASIN, Non-life insurance, postgraduate) and to 27 persons under the various bilateral projects. In addition, a large number of in-country training courses were held.

Perspectives and outlook

Orientation of the cooperation programme

The Swiss Delegation expressed the intention to strengthen the cooperation according to the established lines. The programme is regularly discussed between the federal and provincial authorities. On these occasions new ideas and opportunities for further cooperation in the selected sectors are identified and further pursued.

Projects under Preparation

a) Support to the Forestry Pre-Investment Centre, NWFP

The meeting was informed that a fact-finding mission took place in February and further planning will be undertaken during this year.

b) Shelter for Low Income Communities Investment Programme

The Swiss Delegation reiterated its willingness to provide assistance towards the implementation of the forthcoming

investment programme. A formal request will be submitted in this respect.

c) Sarhad Provincial Conservation Strategy

The Swiss Delegation informed the meeting that a request for financial support to the implementation of the Sarhad Provincial Conservation Strategy has been forwarded to the Government of Switzerland through IUCN. An appraisal of the project proposal is planned to be undertaken soon.

Project Ideas

The Swiss Delegation mentioned that the following ideas for assistance will be pursued in the near future:

a) Enterprise and Skill Development

The Government of Switzerland intends to field a mission in the coming months to identify suitable pilot activities in this sector. This mission will be prepared through a number of local workshops, to be attended by experienced persons from all relevant quarters. The possibility of supporting the private sector will be the primary focus for the mission.

b) Ecological Rehabilitation

The Government of Switzerland has expressed its preparedness to discuss with the Government of Pakistan and NWFP a project on ecological rehabilitation of areas affected by the Afghan refugees. Detailed discussions on this subject should take place in the coming months. The representative of NWFP Department of Forest mentioned further requirements for assistance, such as Shangla Pass Reforestation, Environmental NGO, etc.

c) Rural Support NGO in Sindh

In the course of the implementation of the study on Rural Development Strategy for Sindh Arid Zones, for which the Government of Switzerland has provided financial assistance it was proposed that a new NGO be created in Sindh to better meet the requirements for community development in the province. The final report also emphasises this approach and proposes Terms of Reference for the establishment of such an organisation. The Government of Switzerland is prepared to pursue this idea with the Government of Sindh for future financing.

Mixed Financing

Because of recent discussions on mixed financing in the framework of the OECD, new modalities and conditions for granting adequate/adjusted forms of financial cooperation are still under preparation. It is therefore expected that negotiations about a new cooperation line will be further delayed until such arrangements have been worked out. The Head of the Pakistan Delegation noted the recognition of the new OECD-rules but expressed his concern that a shortage of funds may occur in the meantime. He urges the Swiss Delegation to inquire about the possibilities for continuing assistance during the transitional period.

Humanitarian Aid



The discussions were held in an extremely cordial atmosphere and in the traditional spirit of friendship and cooperation.


