- 2128 Trotz unvorhergesehenen Schwierigkeiten kommt MG Monod wohlbehalten in Kimpo an. Empfangskomitee: MG und Mrs. JO, FI, BL, COL Lee In Sub mit Gattin. Ehrenwein bei MG Jo in Yongsan. Kurz vor Mitternacht wird MG Monod ins "Chosun" gebracht, wo er einem imposanten Empfangsprogramm entgegen-schläft.

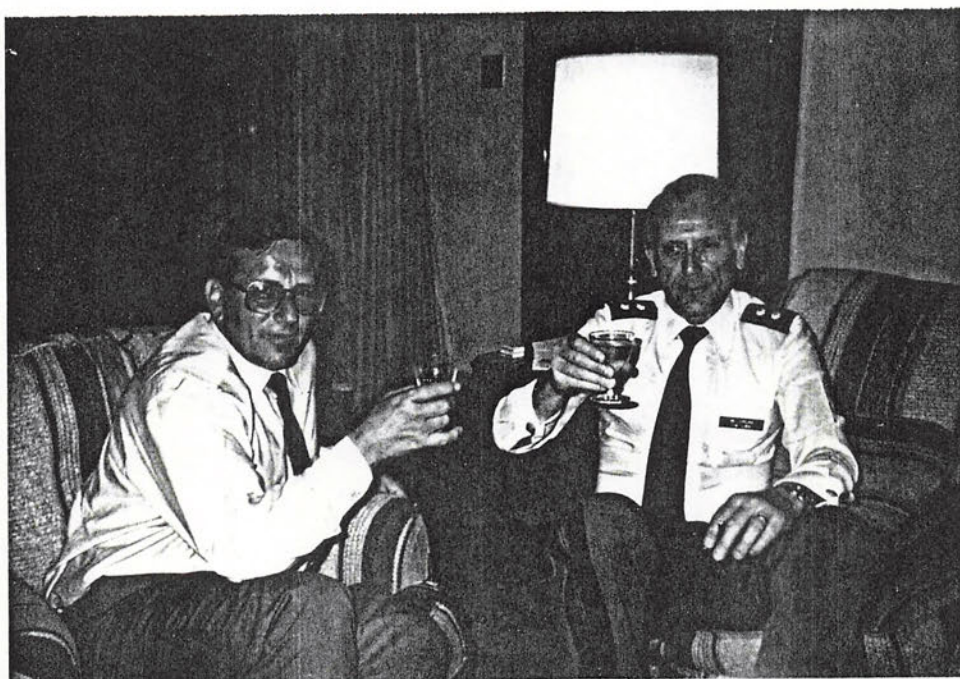

Speech by Chairman of the week commemorating the 34th anniversary of the NNSC.

Chairman: We are today observing the 34th anniversary of the Neutral Nations Supervisory Commission. On our 33rd anniversary all four Members of our Commission commented on the tense situation on the Korean peninsula. Since then, we have noticed the exchange of letters in this room with a hope that a fruitful dialogue should start.

So far there has been little progress in the dialog-issue and we are still waiting for a compromise that will lead to a resumption of the dialogue in one form or the other.

We are all aware of the obstacles that for the moment have prevented the North and the South to start a dialogue. We believe that it is necessary to work even harder during the coming year to overcome the obstacles and thus improve the situation in this part of the world.

Our Delegations have only one main motive for our efforts on the Korean peninsula and that is a humanitarian wish to improve the situation for the Korean people. We are all humble when we look at what we can do to contribute to a peaceful development. Nevertheless, our Commission must, as in the past, continue to support every endeavour to establish contact and ease tension: so we some day in the future will reach the final goal; a peace treaty and a prosperous future for the Korean people.

During the last year, we have worked in different fields to achieve a stable situation, a confidence in a functioning Armistice Agreement and a good starting point for a positive development.

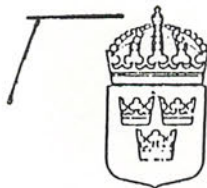
In some fields we have noticed that our work has been fruitful, in some other fields we have seen little progress. We have sometimes had different opinions within our Commission about the best way to lead to the final goal that we all agree upon. Today, it is important to emphasize that we always have been able to cooperate in an atmosphere of mutual understanding and respect for all Delegations opinions. I know that we all agree upon the necessity to continue our work and contacts within the NNSC in the same excellent way as we have done during the last year.



When we in a few minutes are going to the reception on our 34th anniversary, we are satisfied that we can do it together with our colleagues from the two MAC-organisations!

We appreciate that the two sides can celebrate our Commissions anniversary together with us and hope that this will be one step forward towards an improvement of the situation that will followed by others.

Allow me Gentlemen as Chairman of the Week to thank you all for the excellent cooperation during our 33rd year and express a hope that it will continue for the benefit of the Korean people.

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SPEECH BY CHAIRMAN OF THE WEEK AT THE RECEPTION ON THE OCCASION OF  
NNSC's 34th ANNIVERSARY 28 JULY 1987

Honourable Guests, Ladies and Gentlemen, Dear Friends and Colleagues.

We are today observing the 34th anniversary of the Neutral Nations Supervisory Commission and it is a great honour and pleasure for the four Delegations to welcome our distinguished guests [from the MAC] organisations]. We really appreciate your presence here today.

When the Armistice Agreement became effective at 2200 hours on the 27th of July 1953, the governments of Poland, Switzerland, Czechoslovakia and Sweden had accepted to send delegations to Korea. The reasons for that decision were predominantly humanitarian and our governments had a hope that what is said in the preamble of the Armistice Agreement about "a final, peaceful settlement" should be achieved in the near future.

During 34 years, we have followed the situation on the Korean peninsula very closely. Some periods have given hope about a final peaceful settlement, unfortunately, followed by periods of disappointments. Last year started with a situation where the pendulum swing of the interkorean relations once again had reached the negative side. During the last year, we now and then have nourished a hope that we could see the start of a dialogue between the parties concerned.

No anniversary ceremonial language could - or should - hide the fact that for the time being, our hope has declined and the final, peaceful settlement seems to be far away.

In this situation, it is vital that all our Delegations work even harder to contribute to create an atmosphere of mutual trust which is the prerequisite for an improved situation.

If one side of the coin for the time being is rather dark, we should also look at the other side. For 34 years, we have had an agreement which has been the essential foundation stone for a situation much better than before the 27th of July 1953. We must also pay attention to that fact and appreciate the work of our predecessors who have contributed to an, in general, functioning Armistice Agreement even if we today have adopted our work to what is realistic to accomplish.





When we look at that side of the coin, we can get inspiration to continue and strengthen our effort and to appreciate all the minor or major steps forward which can be taken.

We greet today in this NNSC building, representatives from the institutions which are directly responsible for the maintenance of the Armistice Agreement. We hope that this meeting will provide a basis for a trustful cooperation. For us in the NNSC delegations, who have opportunities to meet, regularly, our Colleagues from the MAC on both sides, it is a very joyful event that we today, for the first time, have a possibility to meet all our Honourable MAC Colleagues. We regard your presence here as a recognition of the NNSC institution and, naturally, also as a very positive first step towards a better mutual understanding.

The environment in which we are living and working is sometimes causing misunderstanding, distrust and suspicion. Patience, understanding and a positive belief in the future are necessary characteristics for organisations such as ours. We should start our 35th working-year with a confidence that we will be able to improve the situation.

As this will be the only speech during this reception, I am asking kindly our Honourable Guests as well as the Colleagues from NNSC to join me in a toast expressing hopes for:

- a peaceful development on the Korean peninsula resulting in peace and happiness for the Korean people;
- mutual respect between our Delegations, and
- hope for a constructive cooperation within the frame of the Armistice Agreement.
